Crop Captains wanted

Next year we want to introduce the idea of Crop Captains – one person (or a group) who takes the lead on all aspects of growing a particular crop, for example successional sowing, thinning, etc. Not necessarily doing all the work but taking more than a keen interest in 'their' crop. We can change crops the following season and start to really 'grow' our knowledge, plus share our experience with successors. We'll have comprehensive notes and sowing plans available and obviously the full collaboration of our gardening experts.

This is not compulsory (!) but should make the gardening experience more rewarding, and we really do need to be sharing this aspect of running the garden. We tried this with the Carrots this year and it worked really well.

Here is a list of crops needing a Captain and there are some example notes at the end, so if you would like to give it a go then let us know which crop or crops you would prefer. *Please!*

Beans (Broad, French, Runner)	Beetroot, Parsnip	Cabbages
Carrots	Courgette, Cucumber	Brussels, Broccoli, Kale
Salads (Lettuce, rocket, radish)	Tomatoes	Leeks

Crop notes

Here are some sample crop notes which we'll use next year to manage our sowing and planting.

Crop	Row cm	Apart cm	Depth cm	Sow	Grow	Tender Hardy
Beans (Broad)	20	20	5	Sow seeds 5cm (2in) deep and 20cm (8in) apart. They are best sown in double rows, with the rows 20cm (8in) apart. If a second double row is needed this should be positioned 60cm (2ft) away from the first. Sow a few extra seeds at the end of the rows to fill in any gaps produced by seeds that don't germinate.	Taller varieties will need supporting, so place a stout stake at each corner of the double row, and every 1.5m (5ft) round the rows, and run string around the stakes at 30cm (1ft) intervals from the ground. Water plants when they begin to flower and again two weeks later – watering at other times is only needed during prolonged droughts.	T
